

**THE AUDACITY OF CAMPAIGN PROMISES:
THE OBAMA AGENDA MEETS FISCAL REALITY**

Leonard Burman is the director of the Tax Policy Center and a senior fellow at the Urban Institute. Treasury's deputy assistant secretary for tax analysis from 1998 to 2000, Burman developed major proposals to expand access to savings for low-income families. He was a senior analyst at the Congressional Budget Office from 1989 to 1997 and has taught at Georgetown University. He is the author of *The Labyrinth of Capital Gains Tax Policy: A Guide for the Perplexed* and coeditor of *Taxing Capital Income*. Recent research examined presidential candidates' tax plans, the individual alternative minimum tax, the changing role of taxation in social policy, and tax incentives for savings, retirement, and health insurance.

Howard Gleckman (moderator) is the editor of the Tax Policy Center's blog, *TaxVox*, and a senior research associate at the Urban Institute. He was formerly a senior correspondent in the Washington bureau of *BusinessWeek*, where he covered tax and budget issues, health, and elder care. He is the author of a spring 2009 book on long-term care, *How Will We Care for Our Parents?* He was a 2006-2007 media fellow at the Kaiser Family Foundation and a visiting fellow at the Center for Retirement Research at Boston College from 2006 to 2008.

Rudolph G. Penner is a senior fellow at the Urban Institute and has held the Arjay and Frances Miller Chair in Public Policy since 1998. Previously, he was a managing director of the Barents Group, a KPMG company. He was the director of the Congressional Budget Office from 1983 to 1987, a resident scholar at the American Enterprise Institute from 1977 to 1983, and the assistant director for economic policy at the Office of Management and Budget from 1975 to 1977. Other posts include deputy assistant secretary for economic affairs at the Department of Housing and Urban Development and senior staff economist at the Council of Economic Advisers.

Robert Reischauer is the president of the Urban Institute. Before being appointed to this position in 2000, he was a senior fellow in economic studies at the Brookings Institution for five years. He served as the director of the Congressional Budget Office from 1989 to 1995. Earlier posts include senior vice president at the Urban Institute and assistant director for human resources and deputy director at CBO. He is a member and former vice chair of the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission and was the chair of the National Academy of Social Insurance's Restructuring Medicare for the Long Term project.
