

**FORENSIC FAILURE: CASE REOPENED?****Tuesday, March 3, 2009**

**Terence Dunworth** (moderator) is the director of the Urban Institute's Justice Policy Center. He is the principal investigator on the National Institute of Justice Eyewitness Identification Experiment and oversees the center's work on DNA in property crime investigations, forensic evidence in criminal case processing, and prisoner reentry issues. Prior to joining the Institute in 2002, he was the managing vice president of the law and public policy area at Abt Associates and a senior researcher at the RAND Corp. Dunworth has served as a consultant to the World Bank, United Nations, U.S. Department of Justice, and Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts.

**Pete Marone** is the director of the Virginia Department of Forensic Science. He began his career at Pennsylvania's Allegheny County Crime Laboratory in 1971 and came to the Virginia Bureau of Forensic Science in 1978. He became the director of the division's central laboratory in 1998 and was appointed director of the Virginia Department of Forensic Science in 2007. Marone has served on the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors' DNA Credential Review Committee and is a past chair of ASCLD/LAB (Laboratory Accreditation Board). He is a member of the National Research Council's Committee on Identifying the Needs of the Forensic Science Community and chairs the Consortium of Forensic Science Organizations.

**Kenneth E. Melson** is the director of the Executive Office for United States Attorneys at the Department of Justice, a post he has held since 2007. He was a state prosecutor in Virginia for 10 years. In 1983, he joined the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Virginia, where he was the first assistant U.S. attorney for 21 years. Melson is a past president and distinguished fellow of the American Academy of Forensic Sciences and a former chair of the Council of Scientific Society Presidents. He is the Justice Department's representative on the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board and has been an adjunct professor at George Washington University for almost 30 years.

**John Roman** is a senior research associate in the Urban Institute's Justice Policy Center and coauthor of "The DNA Field Experiment." He is managing a study of the rate of wrongful conviction in closed cases and a project developing a forensics blueprint for law enforcement agencies. Roman directed a study of the demand for community interventions with drug-involved arrestees and a cost-benefit analysis of Maryland's death penalty. He was coauthor of "Is There an iCrime Wave?" and coeditor with Jeffrey Butts of *Juvenile Drug Courts and Teen Substance Abuse*.

**Stephen Saloom** joined the Innocence Project as its policy director in 2004. Previously, he directed state policy efforts for the National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers. Saloom has also served as the executive director of the Massachusetts-based Criminal Justice Policy Coalition, an intake attorney at the American Civil Liberties Union of Massachusetts, a lobbyist on behalf of nonprofit organizations at the Connecticut legislature, and an adjunct professor in the graduate program in criminal justice at Suffolk University.
