

THE ELECTION AND THE ECONOMY: WHAT'S AHEAD FOR CIVIL SOCIETY?**Tuesday, November 4, 2008**

Elizabeth Boris (moderator) is the founding director of the Urban Institute's Center on Nonprofits and Philanthropy, which she has led since 1996. She was the first director of the Nonprofit Sector Research Fund at the Aspen Institute from 1991 to 1996. Boris was coeditor with Eugene Steuerle of *Nonprofits and Government: Collaboration and Conflict* and "After Katrina: Public Expectation and Charities Response." Coauthor of *Working in Foundations: Career Patterns of Women and Men*, she is past president of ARNOVA, the Association for Research on Nonprofit Organizations and Voluntary Action.

Paul C. Light is Paulette Goddard Professor of Public Service at New York University's Wagner School of Public Service. Previously, he was vice president and director of governmental studies at the Brookings Institution and founding director of its Center for Public Service. Light has taught at the University of Virginia, University of Minnesota, and Harvard University. He was also senior adviser to the U.S. Senate Governmental Affairs Committee. Light is the author of 21 books, most recently *A Government Ill Executed: The Decline of the Federal Service and How to Reverse It* and *The Search for Social Entrepreneurship*.

Tom Pollak is program director of the Urban Institute's National Center for Charitable Statistics. Coauthor of *The Nonprofit Almanac 2008*, Pollak manages NCCS's web site, data development, and online data services; the *990 Online*, a web-based system for filing IRS Form 990s and state registration forms; and the creation of online systems to help new nonprofit organizations register with the IRS and small organizations notify the IRS that they remain active. Before joining the Urban Institute, Pollak was a senior research associate with Independent Sector, where his work focused on the impact of federal budget changes on the nonprofit sector.

Shirley Sagawa is a principal of sagawa/jospin, a consulting firm specializing in nonprofit strategy and policy. She was the founding managing director of the Corporation for National and Community Service, a special assistant to the president for domestic policy and deputy chief of staff to the first lady during the Clinton administration, and chief counsel for youth policy for the Senate Labor Committee. She and Deborah Jospin are coauthors of *The Charismatic Organization: Eight Ways to Grow a Nonprofit*. Sagawa is also the author of *Common Interest, Common Good: Creating Value through Business and Social Sector Partnerships*.

Roberton Williams is a principal research associate at the Urban Institute and the Urban-Brookings Tax Policy Center. He was with the Congressional Budget Office from 1984 through 2006, most recently as deputy assistant director for tax analysis. In that post, Williams oversaw CBO's research on tax policy issues ranging from the tax treatment of charitable contributions to tax incentives for retirement savings. Earlier, he was in CBO's Health and Human Resources Division, where he analyzed issues related to child poverty, incomes and living arrangements of the elderly, income trends, and inequality. He also taught economics at Williams College.
