

RETHINKING RETIREMENT: OPINIONS, OBSTACLES, OPPORTUNITIES

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John Gomperts is president of Civic Ventures and CEO of Experience Corps. Before joining Experience Corps in 2003, he was chief operating officer at Public Education Network, the nation's largest network of local school reform organizations, and chief of staff of the Corporation for National and Community Service, the federal agency that administers AmeriCorps and the National Senior Service Corps. He has also worked as legislative director for Sen. Harris Wofford and deputy director of the Senate Democratic Leadership Committee.

Eugene Steuerle is an Urban Institute senior fellow and vice president of the Peter G. Peterson Foundation. He is a former deputy assistant secretary of the Treasury for tax analysis and, from 1984 to 1986, served as economic coordinator and original organizer of the Treasury's tax reform effort. Steuerle chaired the 1999 technical panel advising Social Security on its methods and assumptions. He is author of *Contemporary U.S. Tax Policy* and coeditor of *Social Security and the Family*, both from the Urban Institute Press.

Richard Wolf (moderator) reports on domestic policy for *USA TODAY*, where he has worked for 20 years. He previously was the paper's congressional editor and has covered Congress, politics, and health care. From 1975 to 1986, Wolf worked for several Gannett newspapers in New York covering local, county, and state government. He moved to Washington, D.C., in 1986 to report for Gannett News Service.

Ruth Wooden became president of Public Agenda in 2003 after serving as executive vice president–senior counselor at the international public relations firm of Porter Novelli. From 1987 to 1999, she was president of the Advertising Council, the nation's leading producer of public service announcements. During her tenure, the Ad Council collaborated with Public Agenda on *Kids These Days: What Americans Really Think about the Next Generation*. Wooden currently serves as chair of Civic Ventures and as a board member of Independent Sector.

Sheila Zedlewski directs the Urban Institute's Income and Benefits Policy Center, a group of researchers focused on how income is distributed in the United States. Her research deals with retirement income security, poverty, and participation in programs for low-income individuals. Her recent publications include articles on productive aging and poverty among older adults. She currently is analyzing asset accumulation over the life cycle and the potential of using home equity to help finance retirement.
