Nicole Brown has over 17 years of Technology experience and is the President and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Carter Enterprise Solutions, LLC (C-ents). C-ents is a cybersecurity firm certified by the Small Business Administration (SBA) as an 8(a) HUBZone Woman Owned Small Business (WOSB). In 2018, C-ents was approved as the first Cybersecurity-Specific Apprenticeship in the State of Maryland. Nicole holds a Master's of Science Degree in Technology Management from the University of Maryland University College (UMUC) and holds multiple professional certifications to include recognitions as a Project Management Professional (PMP); Certified Information Security Manager (CISM); Certified in Risk and Information Systems Control (CRISC); Microsoft Certified Personal (MCP), Navy Validator and has been ranked as one of the top 25 Cybersecurity Professionals in the United States Department of Navy. She is also one of the first-ever Provisional Assessors certified by the Cybersecurity Maturity Model Certification (CMMC) Accreditation Body. Ms. Brown serves a Cybersecurity Industry Volunteer with the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST), National Initiative for Cybersecurity Education (NICE) Apprenticeship Working Group; the United States (U.S.) Department of Labor (DoL) Office of Apprenticeship - Cyber Security Working Group, and EMPLOY Prince George's - Educational Partnership in IT Careers (EPIC) Business Advisory Council (BAC). Ms. Brown is definitely making a name for herself as a well-respected Cybersecurity Subject Matter Expert (SME) and represents less than 10% of African American women in the Cybersecurity industry.
