

## Protecting the "Third Place:" The Pandemic's Impact on Commercial Corridors and How to Support Them

## **Speaker Biographies**

Jorge González is a research analyst in the Metropolitan Housing and Communities Policy Center at the Urban Institute. He is interested in investigating how the built environment, infrastructure, and other neighborhood assets contribute to the well-being of communities. Prior to joining Urban, González worked for the Mexican federal government assessing and coordinating initiatives to repurpose unused government-owned land and rail infrastructure into sustainable urban developments. Gonzalez earned his BA in International Relations from the Instituto Tecnológico Autónomo de México and his MPP from the University of Chicago as a Fulbright grantee.

Jein Park is a research assistant in the Metropolitan Housing and Communities Policy Center with the Community and Economic Development practice area. Her research interest focuses on economic empowerment through the combination of government policies and community-based initiatives. Before joining Urban, Park conducted field research in Chicago on e-commerce's impact on small businesses and how retail vacancies affect neighborhoods. She has also participated in sustainable urban development research on the Galapagos Islands. Park graduated from the University of Chicago with BAs in public policy studies and sociology. Her honors senior thesis studied how commercialization transformed a desolate meatpacking district into Chicago's trendiest consumption destination.
