Who are victims? Victims, or survivors, are people who have faced any of a range of crimes or abusive experiences, often with significant consequences to their lives. What is victim research? Victim research seeks to understand the impacts of victimization on individuals' and communities' well-being, as well as victims' unique needs, experiences, and barriers to recovery. It also aims to document strategies that effectively prevent victimization and promote victims' healing, safety, and justice. Why do we study victims' experiences? The best way to address a problem that affects millions of Americans is to understand the nuances of victimization and perpetration, and the ways victims can be helped, and then to communicate that knowledge widely to stakeholders at all levels so they can take appropriate action.

Urban's Research and Technical Assistance (TA) Expertise

Urban has a proven team of experts who have directed and contributed to victimfocused projects for over 30 years. Urban's researchers and TA providers collaborate across disciplines to understand the causes and consequences of victimization and to inform actionable prevention and response strategies at the local, state, and national levels. Our victim research portfolio is rooted in four approaches:

- Documenting the widespread causes and consequences of victimization, including risk factors, victim needs, and survivor- and community-level impacts.
- Evaluating promising programs and services at the local and national level to assess their implementation and impact.
- Providing training and technical assistance to organizations and communities to improve their response to victimization in research-informed ways.
- Developing resources and disseminating findings to increase the utility of research for service providers, policymakers, and other stakeholders.

Incorporating Victim and Community Voices

Community-engaged research refers to the practice of explicitly including the input, participation, and reflections of the people and communities most affected by the issue studied—from the design stage of a project to the final recommendations developed from evidence. For Urban's victim-related research, this means including the perspectives of victims, those working with victims, and communities and stakeholders affected by victimization.

In recognition of the unique needs of these populations, our researchers also seek to increase knowledge while ensuring that our work is victim-centered and traumainformed. Our research methods emphasize victim safety and transparency, provide resources and support, and consider contextual issues.

KEY VICTIM RESEARCH EFFORTS

Urban's team has expertise studying a wide range of victimization experiences, ranging from intimate partner and sexual violence to gun violence and mass violence to financial crimes. Examples of topics of focus include:

Intimate Partner and Dating Violence. Intimate partner violence (IPV) may include physical violence, emotional abuse, economic abuse, and stalking by a current or former spouse or dating partner. Urban's research explores unique victimization experiences and informs programs to better serve all victims as well as people who do harm.
