

# 500 Cities Data Challenge

## *Putting Local Data to Work for Healthier Communities*

Are you using or would you like to use a **data-driven** approach to improve health outcomes, prevention, and healthy behaviors in your community? Is your idea **innovative**, **collaborative**, and working **across sectors**? Are you interested in exploring a question at **the intersection of health and other social outcomes**? Then we encourage your organization to apply to the 500 Cities Data Challenge.

### The 500 Cities Data Challenge

Researchers and practitioners from all sectors are encouraged to use the 500 Cities dataset in combination with other non-health data sources to:

- 1) **Conduct analysis to answer a cross-sector question**, or
- 2) **Build practical tools to target a cross-sector intervention.**

The competition is open to only those ideas that advance understanding of health outcomes, prevention, and unhealthy behaviors in relation to other sector outcomes – including housing, education, transportation, violence, civic participation, and others. The data challenge is especially seeking organizations working in health and social determinants of health in rural or underrepresented communities. Technical assistance will be available for those organizations who require support in data analysis and research.

### About The 500 Cities Data

In collaboration with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the CDC Foundation launched the [500 Cities project](#) in 2015. Using one-of-a-kind small area estimation approaches, the 500 Cities dataset provides city-level data on health outcomes, risky behaviors, and use of prevention services for the 500 largest American cities.

This important new dataset and corresponding website sheds light on the geographic distribution of health-related outcomes, providing a unique opportunity for community leaders to bridge the gap between health outcomes and housing, education, transportation, and more.
